Methodology

- Survey conducted online with 1,000 registered voters
- Survey fielded December 14-21, 2023
- Sample size of 336 Black registered voters
- Oversamples of 75 AAPI and 75 Latino registered voters
- Margin of Error: ±3.36%







OHITstrategies



- Voters are generally satisfied with the direction of the state and inflation and cost of living is the most top of mind issue for voters today. Voters would rather see the state's \$11 billion of unrestricted budget surplus invested in new services for the people over tax rebates.
- In thinking about the state budget, voters strongly support priorities that will make their lives more affordable given the high cost of living and inflation. These priorities include more affordable healthcare, prescription drug prices, housing, and childcare. They also support funding elderly and disability care and rural healthcare services.
- Most Georgians feel that abortion should be legal in most cases and the government should not interfere in a
 personal healthcare decision. Voters are concerned about getting access to abortion care under the six-week
 ban and worry about potential legal implications for parents and healthcare providers.







- Black voters support Medicaid expansion, marijuana legalization, and rent control policies more than any other race.
- While Black men are more supportive of marijuana legalization than Black women, Black women are more supportive of Medicaid expansion and rent control policies than Black men.
- When looking at Black voters by generation, **Boomers are more likely to support Medicaid expansion**, rent control policies, and landlord standard requirements while **Gen Z is more likely to support marijuana legalization**.

A higher percentage of Black Georgians prioritize affordable housing, racism and discrimination, and criminal justice/police brutality than other racial and ethnic groups.

A lower percentage of Black Georgians identified jobs and economy, healthcare, and education as top priority than other racial and ethnic groups.

A higher percentage of Black Gen Z Georgians prioritize healthcare, climate change, and paid family leave as top issues than the other generations.

A lower percentage identified affordable housing as well as crime and violence as top priorities than other groups. However, Black Gen Z Georgians' priorities are largely spread out, with nearly every issue reaching at least 10 percent.

A higher percentage of Gen Z Georgians, irrespective of race and ethnicity, care more about racism and discrimination, criminal justice and police brutality, and paid family leave than other generations. They are on par with Boomers on the importance of abortion access.

They are less likely to prioritize the remaining issues than other groups, but their concern across all issues is much more spread than the other groups.





> At 89 percent, Black voters are most likely of racial and ethnic groups to support spending surplus money on expanding access to affordable housing.

> At 66 percent, Black voters are most likely of racial and ethnic groups to support the legalization of marijuana.














Would you support or oppose legalizing marijuana for adult use in Georgia? Responses by Race and Gender over Time

Marijuana legalization continues to have support of the majority of all groups examined.














Would you support or oppose legalizing marijuana for adult use in Georgia? Responses by Race and Gender



Black men support marijuana legalization at a higher rate than Black women, a twelvepercentage point difference.

















Would you support or oppose legalizing marijuana for adult use in Georgia? *Responses by Generation*

> Younger Black voters support marijuana legalization at a higher rate than older Black voters, though a majority of older Black voters still support it.

> There is an inverse relationship between strongly support and somewhat support by region. For example, though Metro-Atlanta is more supportive of legalization overall, those in the Black Belt are more likely to strongly support legalization.








Medicaid Expansion +

Medicaid expansion is widely supported by all Georgia voters.


At 88 percent, Black voters overwhelmingly support expanding Medicaid expansion more than any other racial and ethnic group.



Would you support or oppose allowing cities, counties, or the state to enact rent control, or limits on the amount of rent that landlords can increase on tenants every year? *Responses by Race*




Black voters and white voters are on par with each other in support of rent control.

A majority of Black Georgians of every generation support rent control, but younger Black voters are the least supportive. This is likely because they still live with parents or are in dorms.














Rent Control

Would you support or oppose allowing cities, counties, or the state to enact rent control, or limits on the amount of rent that landlords can increase on tenants every year? Responses by Educational Attainment



Black college-educated voters are more supportive of rent control than Black non-college voters. Black non-college voters were 10 percentage points more likely to say they neither support nor oppose rent control.



Which statement is closest to your view on abortion? by Race and Gender

Abortion should be illegal.

Black men were the most likely to strongly support the view that abortion should be legal in almost all cases at 46 percent.

About 40 percent of white women and 20 percent of Black women believe that either abortion should be legal in just a few cases or that it should be illegal. This confirms that views on abortion in Georgia continue to be nuanced.














Reproductive Healthcare +

Rate your concern: The ban prohibits abortion after six weeks of pregnancy, before many people know they are pregnant. Responses by Political Leaning



Black Democrats were the most likely to express extreme concern (64 percent) over the six-week abortion ban.

Although Black Republicans were the most likely to be unconcerned (14 percent), it is important to note that 72 percent are extremely or somewhat concerned.


> Black Trump voters were the most likely to express extreme concern (69 percent) that the six-week abortion ban overreaches government mandate.

Rate your concern: Peoples' lives could be put at risk because healthcare providers might fear legal repercussions for administering life-saving care to patients. Response by Race and Generation



Over 80 percent of Georgia voters are extremely or somewhat concerned about legal repercussions for healthcare providers, and Black voters are the most likely of all racial and ethnic groups to be concerned.

At 82 percent, Black Boomers were most likely to find it **extremely** concerning that potential legal repercussions for healthcare providers could put lives at risk.
